

Cultural Considerations

Background Notes

Child welfare work involves working with a variety of cultures, religions, lifestyles and races. Developing self-awareness about your own culture and the commonalities and differences with the families you work with is invaluable. In addition, diversity in the work environment, not always visible, will enrich the atmosphere of the office as well as enhance the services provided to clients.

Tasks / Assignments:

- ❑ Talk with your supervisor about the different communities you will be working with. Ask about the cultural, racial, sexual orientation, religious, lifestyles and other common populations that are part of the work in your local office. Are there common themes or needs in regard to child welfare that the different groups share? Are there unique culturally appropriate services for these families?
- ❑ Read the article: "White Privilege: Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack" by Peggy McIntosh. To find the article go to www.google.com and search for the author or title. Talk with your Supervisor or co-workers about how this appears in the field of child welfare?

Tasks / Assignments:

- Find out how your office staff arrange for interpreters or translation services. Observe an interview conducted in a foreign language. How would having an interpreter affect your interview with a client?
- Follow a case of a family with a culture different from your own either beginning at screening or initial assessment. Ask the coworker managing the case how they handle the case unique to the culture of the family.
- Consider challenges & strengths you might face internally in your work with clients with differences and discuss this with your Supervisor.
- Check with your Supervisor about training that is available related to cultural competency and how to register for these classes.
